Meeting report August 14

The meeting opened with Stuart's reflection on places that influence us. Chairman John welcomed our Rotary visitors Jenny and Peter and reported on his makeup at Hamilton Rotary Club. President Bill thanked the club for the primary school event and reminded us of important upcoming dates. Whitehorse Historical Society on 17 September and the next Peridot on 17 November. Warwick reported on Sunday's farmer's market, reminded us about membership and told of Thanushi Peiris success at the Deakin Community awards. Stuart reminded us of the 98% reduction in polio and that our US\$1000 had been remitted. Martine is representing the club at a Box Hill Institute event next Tuesday. Ray reported on the Blackburn market (good day for sausages) and that both our NYSF candidates had been successful. The Whitehorse market was also a successful winner at the Deakin Community awards. Stuart raised \$23 in fines and the raffle raised \$61. Chris Tuck was wished bon voyage for his travels.



Our guest speaker was former member PDG Jenny Cockburn. Her topic was the Challenge of Deafness. Jenny provided statistics on the prevalence of deafness and hearing loss at various ages. She explained with slides the various functions of the Deafness Foundation of which she is now the CEO. She mentioned congenital cytomegalovirus that can cause deafness in infants and the importance of preventing rubella in pregnancy. Jenny gave details of the need for prevention of noise-induced hearing loss and handed out a pamphlet on the safe use of unprotected noise sources and their time limits. She explained how clubs can assist the foundation and the various promotions occurring later in the year. The reason for choosing the butterfly logo was explained. She also touched on links with cochlear patients.

D9810 USED STAMP COLLECTION

Robbie has just delivered a large box of stamps to Carrol Farmer for which she thanked us profusely. So, thank you to all at Forest Hill and our honorary members who have contributed. So far this has raised \$105,007.00 since starting in 1991.

Carrol said that stamps are sold by weight so please leave a margin of 2cm around each stamp and they need to be on a single piece of paper (not the double corner of the envelope).

As at July 2017 they are valued as follows

\$15/kg for \$1 stamps and 70 cent commemorative stamps

\$30/kg for higher value and foreign stamps

\$8/kg for stamps under 70 cents

NOTE: STAMPS WITHOUT PAPER BACKING HAVE VERY LITTLE VALUE

So, please collect every stamp you get, however few and give them to me.
