#### **MEETING REPORT**

A good attendance (19 plus guest speaker Tracey Farnsworth) enjoyed the warm embrace of Bucatinis on Monday night. Judy L and Judy M, Glenys Coates, our Rotoract colleague, Sarah Power and Tracey's mother in law joined the members.

President Stuart had a long list club updates and reminders (covered in his notes). Chairman Bob L led the meeting and reports leading up to a "challenging" Sergeant at Arms session from the refreshed and invigorated Bob, back from his and Barb's travels to the West.

Chairman Bob then introduced Tracey to speak about her NGO. Her personal back story with her links to Vanuatu and recent membership of the Rotary Club of Malvern East and Chadstone showed how she had been motivated to establish her NGO to support children in Vanuatu, including the outer islands. It is always daunting to hear how a single person has the drive and energy, even more so in Tracey's case, to identify the need and then mobilise resources in Australia to assist others. The challenge of developing the in-country support network and identifying needs has been handled very well with local resources. It was pleasing to hear of her efforts to include local unemployed youth in the distribution process so they developed skills which would help them become part of the Seasonal Workers Program that brings Ni Van workers to Australia for six month periods to work in the horticultural and orchard industries.

Hopefully, Tracey's presentation will help members start thinking about what are the most appropriate and cost-effective ways to support identified needs overseas (and in Australia). Currently, there are 4-5 different mechanisms for delivering services to identified target groups in Australia and overseas. These include RI activities through club, District and Global grant funding, very small single activity NGOs such as Hope Katolo, larger more diverse individual driven NGOs such as Progress Pikinini and the specialist international NGOs of varying sizes but with proven management capacity and the ability to leverage additional government funding. One of these larger, but local NGOs, International Needs Australia, will provide the guest speaker for our meeting at the end of October.

The club recognised his Rotary contribution by awarding him a Paul Harris Fellow in 2010.

Graham had a strong faith in The Lord. He enjoyed time with his large family and was very proud when his 16<sup>th</sup> grand child was born in January, 2019. He played a piano accordion and enjoyed singing. He became a TV star in 2016 when the ABC showed a segment on the benefits of dance therapy for Parkinson sufferers. Graham devoted hours to caring for his beloved Joan and Joan seemed to benefit from the Tango.

Graham only recently moved into palliative care. A passionate Essendon supporter he would have been shattered by their insipid performance on Saturday night. Family members read passages of scripture to Graham in his final minutes. We send our condolences to his wife Joan and his family. The world has lost a fine gentleman.

**Outback Spirit** have been regulars at our market for years and they also regularly sell at the Rotary Club of Mt Waverley and Dingley Farmers markets amongst others. Juleigh and Ian Robins make all their chutneys, sauces, pickles and marinades at their new Dandenong factory. Not only are they delicious but they are gluten and MSG free. Ian and Juleigh are recognised pioneers of the Australian native food industry and have been at the forefront since its inception in 1986. They established Robins Foods in 1997. Ian and Juleigh's vision is to bring Indigenous foods into the mainstream food market and the company is the industry leader supplying the **Outback Spirit** branded range of products to supermarkets nationally in Australia.

In 2000, Ian and Juleigh decided to formalise their relationships with the company's indigenous suppliers and established an ethical supply chain that ensures that benefits from the sale of **Outback Spirit** products go back to the Aboriginal people who are developing their own enterprises based on native foods. They established the Outback Spirit Foundation to further help the Aboriginal people.

Juleigh is an accomplished cook and together with Ian has written three native food cookbooks – Wild Lime (1996 Allen & Unwin) and Wild Classics (2000 Allen & Unwin – with Ian Robins) and Wild Food (2010 Lantern Books, a Viking Books imprint).
