# LAST WEEK'S MEETING

# Report of the Meeting Held on Monday 4th March 2013

After the meeting was opened by Sergeant Stan, President Bob made announcements concerning the unfortunate death of Lesley Morcom and her funeral that afternoon, the very enjoyable involvement with the GSE team that day, and also that there would be a District ARHRF luncheon on 16<sup>th</sup> April at Riversdale Golf Club. Chris Tuck then discussed his attendance at the Multi-District PETS seminar at Ballarat. The main subject was membership and attendance, together with RAWCS and tax-deductibility, and future vision.

Two of the GSE team members were hosted by club members, (Glenys and John McPhee), and these two girls from Malaysia, Crystal and Vilasini, then told us about themselves. Crystal mentioned her job as a consultant for a gas company, her sponsoring club and that all secondary school students must volunteer for a not-for profit organisation, so quite a large number of students join Interact followed by Rotaract. She has four siblings. Vilasini has two brothers, and a daughter with Downs Syndrome. She is studying Psychology and likes Vegemite (as it is slightly similar to Marmite.) The full GSE team saw over NADRASCA including its farm (where the watering system is working well) and then the RSPCA. Glenys thanked everyone who helped during the day especially Ray and John for their driving of the team.

The two markets were mentioned and Stuart reminded us about the footy tipping starting in three weeks.

John Donaghey then gave his talk on peace, specifically about the anti-nuclear sign which was designed by Lord Bertrand Russell. The sign which was never patented and was for international solidarity and peace, has its originals stored at Bradford University. Pablo Picasso was the designer of the dove for peace and a Japanese girl with leukaemia was the designer of the origami peace crane.

John Liddell from Beyond Zero Emissions then gave his talk on Zero Carbon Australia, which has the aim to get Australia off fossil fuels within 10 years. BZE is a research and communications organisation with no political affiliations and has many volunteers, and has the aim to get Australia onto renewable fuels.

The plans of the organisation are for six separate steps

- a) Stationary plans
- b) Buildings plans
- c) Transport plans
- d) Land Use plans
- e) Renewable energy export plans
- f) Industrial processors plans

These plans will be put out from 2010 to 2104, and the first one was 170 pages in length. Stationary energy is for commercial off-the-shelf technology, looking at concentrated solar thermal technology which stores energy in concentrated salt (of Na and K) stored at 290\* and then heated to 565\*. Then when the sun goes down the electricity is generated during the night as the salt cools. The technology has been used in Spain for many years producing 20 MW. Nevada has almost completed a plant to produce 110MW and will only cost twice the Spanish plant. Up to May 2012 there were 6 countries (California, Spain, Morocco, Saudi Arabia, Tunisia and China) aiming to produce 2.1GW electricity using this method.

Wind power is the cheapest mature renewable and investment has gone up by 30% in the past decade. However China will produce 90 Hazelwoods in the next 10 years producing 150GW, whilst Denmark will have 50% of its power from wind by 2025, and South Australia will be second to Denmark within 10 years. The aim will be to be producing 325TW world-wide within the decade. In Australia there are three renewable components, viz., solar thermal, wind power and an upgraded electricity grid and BZE hopes to have 60% of total demand in 10 years. There are 23 recognized suitable areas for wind power in Australia (but not at Longwood unfortunately) and so conventional generation will produce the 40% balance.

Concerns are often discussed about wind and solar not being suitable for baseload generation but Australia is more blessed with sun and wind than all other countries in the world except the Sahara and Mongolia.

In conclusion, the use of renewable energy sources will secure our future and the climate, it is technically do-able, it is fully resourced and it has been fully costed and will end up by costing 3% of our GDP over 10 years.

Chairman Bob Williams then passed the meeting back to the president after a very informative and clearly-spoken talk.
