

LAST WEEK'S MEETING

Our speaker for the evening was Warwick Duncan who spoke to us about, amongst other things, 'a liver transplant's trek across (sic) the Kokoda Track'. Like many of our speakers Warwick had an amazing story to tell.

He was, in his own words, born and bred in the eastern suburbs and is currently 54 years of age. For most of his working life he has been a sales manager but now runs his own company dealing with social media marketing. His life changed drastically 24 years ago when he contracted a rare form of hepatitis which attacked his liver. He was lucky enough to find a suitable donor and flew to Brisbane during the pilots' strike to receive his new liver on 25/10/1989. While in hospital he found out about the World Transplant Games and decided to participate in the swimming events once he had recovered. These games are held every 2 years and Warwick participated in at least four of them. He then took up long distance swimming with the view to swim the English Channel, and create awareness of organ donation, but he was not able to raise sufficient sponsorship.

Warwick then decided that on the 25th of October each year he would 'tick' an item off his 'bucket list' in memory of his donor. He then proceeded to show us some photos of some of the things he had done including sky diving and hot air ballooning. In 2008 he decided to walk the Kokoda Track with his two sons and tried to get other transplant recipients interested. Unfortunately, they were not as fit or committed as Warwick and dropped away over time. Warwick trained for a year in the Dandenong ranges with his sons, sometimes traversing the course twice in one day to build his fitness and stamina and they eventually made it to the Kokoda track.

The Kokoda track is approx 96km from end to end but that does not take into account the hills and valleys in between. This equates to 50 hrs trekking over 8 days but Warwick and his sons opted for the 9 day option. Warwick showed us photos of the steep slopes they went up and down, the rivers they crossed as well as the villages they stayed at. He also mentioned the constant danger of suffering injuries by a simple miss-step, the war memorials visited and the 'museums' established by local villagers. One of the more unusual stories related to an RAAF plane that was damaged on landing and was being disassembled into smaller pieces that could be flown out.

Another interesting aspect of Warwick's story was the close relationship that he and his family developed with the family of the organ donor that extended his life and gave him the opportunity to do so many things. Warwick said that it was not common amongst transplant recipients or donor families to make contact and that he was fortunate to have established such a strong connection.

Warwick believes that he is the longest surviving liver transplant recipient in Australia and his story was certainly inspiring. He displayed humility and showed a great respect and affection toward his organ donor and her family. A very positive story about organ donation and what can be achieved by getting a second chance at life.
